

## Help Keep Our Trees Healthy

### Please Report Gypsy Moth Infestations

It is not too late to report gypsy moth infestations. The Village Forester is collecting information regarding outbreak locations to determine a course of action for the 2006 season. If you notice evidence of gypsy moths on your property, please contact the Village so the map may be updated.

### Dutch Elm Disease and Hazard Tree Surveys

The Village Forester will be conducting the annual Dutch elm disease survey to identify diseased elms in the Village. If you receive a notice from the Village, the trees should be removed within ten days, per Village ordinance.

The Village Forester will also be conducting a hazardous tree survey to identify trees that present a hazard to roadways. Trees will be evaluated and marked for either pruning or removal, depending on the type of hazard identified. Residents with trees located on private property that pose a hazard to a roadway will be notified via letter by the Village. Hazardous trees that are located on private streets will be marked and the Road Associations will be notified of the location(s) and recommended remedial action(s)

# Police Report

## **Road Safety:**

Motorists, bicyclists, joggers, and walkers all share our roadways. Please exercise courtesy and care. Bicyclists, joggers and walkers should all wear reflective or at least light color clothing. Many recommend that all bicyclists, regardless of age wear safety helmets.

## **Scams:**

Be careful about letting people on your property. Offenders have been known to offer unsolicited work (driveway sealing, tree cutting, etc) or claimed to represent an organization, in order to gain entry into houses.

Magazine and other door to door solicitors have claimed to be from local organizations, schools etc. Many solicitors travel the country, trying to appear to be locally based. Buyer beware.

The Riverwoods Police Department does issue solicitor/peddler permits. They must be displayed on the outer clothing of any permitted person. The permit is not an endorsement of the organization.


## **Emergency Responses:**

As emergency vehicles respond, having your street address visible during the day and night can assist them in their rapid response. Often times, persons only have the address on one side of their mailbox. The vehicle may be responding from either direction. The address should be clearly visible from both directions. This is very important for your safety. Seconds can make the difference.

## **Motorcycle Ride July 17th**

The Pediatric Brain Tumor Foundation will have their 2005 motorcycle ride on Sunday, July 17th from 9:00-11:30am. They will start at Allstate in Northbrook and travel north on Milwaukee through the Village. They will travel through the Village again by coming down Riverwoods and Saunders Road to return to Allstate. Based on last years' numbers of participants, the organizers admit it may take 40 minutes to get everyone through intersections. This means residents on Riverwoods and Saunders, and the residents in Thorngate lose access in and out of their homes for the entire time it takes the riders to get through. If emergency services are needed, officers will be able to stop traffic to allow access.

# Fire Department Helpful Hint Worth Repeating

## Attention: Outdoor Chef

---

After performing your magic, be sure to dispose of used charcoal and ashes in a fireproof container – and then only after the coals have cooled completely. Because it can remain hot for several days, used charcoal has been the cause of many accidental fires in garages and on decks. To be absolutely certain that your recently used charcoal will not become a problem, thoroughly douse it with water. The result may be a bit messy, but there would be no danger of it reigniting. And another thing: NEVER for any reason, use your charcoal grill indoors – including in the garage – because a build-up of carbon Monoxide could result. An open garage door might not provide adequate ventilation.

## Plant Sale Committee News

Watch for *Hydrangea arborescens* (Smooth Hydrangea) coming to the Riverwoods Plant Sale next spring. Unlike many of the other Hydrangea varieties available from local nurseries, this plant is native to our area. Typically we find this plant in open woods, shaded wetlands, and along woodland streams. Large white flowers appear in June and July and make great dried arrangements. Use this plant as an attractive beginning for reforestation. More plant information to come.

## Ask the Plant Ladies

Dear Plant Ladies,

*I have poison ivy ALL OVER my property but not yet all over me.*

*Help. How do I get rid of it? How do I get rid of it without getting it?*

*Signed, Not itching yet*

Dear Not Itching and hoping to stay that way,

In the first place, if you don't touch it, you won't get it. That's easy. If you want to get rid of it, that's harder. Poison ivy is a vine. In order to kill it and prevent it from re-growing, you must kill the vine. You can pull it out, but if you don't get it all, oh dear, it's back. Besides, you may pull out something you really like by mistake. Try the cut and paint method. Locate the vine and cut it near the ground. Paint the part that's left with an herbicide like roundup or poison ivy killer. Take the part you cut and put it in a plastic or paper bag and get rid of it.

Now the hard part. How not to get it. Remember, the part that gets you is the oil. Wear as much clothing as you need to cover yourself all over, including and most importantly, latex gloves. As soon as possible, you have about 45 minutes after the oil touches your skin, throw everything you were wearing in the wash. Discard the gloves. Clean your tools, your shoes and yourself, especially forearms, with rubbing alcohol and get in the shower. Stay in the shower and rinse off for a few minutes before finishing with soap since soap tends to spread it. Good luck.

I don't even put the clothes in the hamper. They go right in the washing machine so I don't have to touch them again. Keep the rubbing alcohol and a supply of paper towels handy. Don't touch door knobs, etc. with the latex gloves because the oil can transfer. If you do touch something, wash it off with the rubbing alcohol. It is our suggestion, that even if all this wonderful advice fails you, do not take the rubbing alcohol internally.


